I hope all is going well for you all.

Even though the numbers at our Federation Conference were down from past years I think it was successful. It is so much better meeting in person than having a Zoom meeting. I hope you all are starting to meet in person. You need to recruit new members to keep the chapters alive. We have closed too many chapters in the last two years because no one wants to take an officer position. To keep our federation alive we need the chapters. You have to do recruiting to get the young members and get them involved. You have to make a reason for them to get involved. Having an evening meeting may be necessary to get active still employed members involved. Maybe one a quarter would be great with a program that would benefit them and their specific needs. I am available to come and be a part of your meeting. As the Federation Service Officer, I have many topics to share. Below is some current information to share at your current meeting or include in a newsletter:

#### Life insurance

If you elected to be covered under the Federal Employee's Group Life Insurance program and filled out a Standard Form 2823, Designation of Beneficiary, any FEGLI benefits will be paid to those you named. If you do not have a designation on file, the proceeds of your insurance will be distributed according to the standard order of precedence:

- first, to a surviving spouse.
- second, if none, to your child or children, with the share of any deceased child distributed among the descendants of that child, if any.
- third, if none of the above, to your parents in equal shares or in its entirety to the lone survivor.
- fourth, if none of the above, to your next of kin as determined under the laws of the State where you lived.

#### Survivor annuity

If you have at least 18 months of creditable service when you die, your spouse will be entitled to a survivor annuity. That annuity will be a percentage of the annuity you

were either entitled to as an employee or were receiving as an annuitant. For a CSRS spouse, the standard is 55 percent. For a FERS spouse it is 50 percent.

However, if your spouse agreed to a lesser annuity amount (or none at all), that agreement will determine the amount of the annuity. Note: while retiring CSRS employees can designate any amount of annuity between \$1 and the full amount, FERS retirees have only one option other than 50 percent—25 percent; in both cases, the spouse's written consent is required.

If you are a FERS employee, your spouse would also be entitled to a basic death benefit, plus 50 percent of either your final salary or your high-3, if that is higher. That death benefit currently is just below \$35,000; it is indexed for inflation each year.

### Thrift Savings Plan

TSP-3, Beneficiary Election form: If you did not make such a designation, the payout will follow the standard order of precedence spelled out above.

If your survivor spouse is the beneficiary, he or she can keep the account open and enjoy the same management and withdrawal rights that you did. If there are any other beneficiaries, the account will have to be closed out. They can do that either by withdrawing the money or by transferring it to an individual retirement account (IRA) or other qualifying retirement savings plan.

In a controversial decision, the US Food and Drug Administration approved the first new Alzheimer's disease drug in nearly 20 years. The experimental drug "Aaducanumab" was approved for early phases of Alzheimer's disease despite an FDA advisory committee concluding last year that there is not enough evidence to support the effectiveness of the treatment.

The drug was developed for patients with mild cognitive impairment, not severe dementia, and intended to slow progression of Alzheimer's disease not just ease symptoms.

This is an important. We have never before been this close to approval of a medication for Alzheimer's that could change the progression of the disease, not just the symptoms.

For those with mild cognitive impairment and their families, the drug had given hope.

The treatment is very different than what we have had before. We have never had a medication that would slow down Alzheimer's disease progression. Current available



medication such as donepezil or meantime only help modestly with the symptoms but do not slow down the disease's progression.

The Kansas Federation contributions have declined by \$15,000+ from contributions made in 2020 due to COVID. In March 2020 donations were \$38,742.62 and in March 2021 were \$23,529.88.

The 2021 Alzheimer's committee determined that the goal per member for 2021 will remain at \$6.00 per member.

Navella and I would like to thank John Ourada and Chapter 0280 for the 67<sup>th</sup> Kansas Federation Conference in Salina, KS. At the conference, my report was on the table. Some people did not pick the report up and I just hit high lights of it in my oral report. You can go to <https://www.narfe.org/site/ks/files/fullName25419.pdf> to read the report.



**We would like to thank all who have been monitoring the Kansas Legislature since January. The Kansas Legislative Session lasted 85 days and their first adjournment was on April 9,2021. The Kansas Legislature returned May 3, 2021 and adjourned on May 8,2021, at 2:14 AM. The Legislature completed its work on the state budget, tax reform, school funding and other legislative matters.**

**May 3, 2021, was the first day of the Veto Session and is typically focused on considering the items the Governor vetoed during April break. It requires a 2/3 majority in both Chambers to override a veto which means they need 27 votes in the Senate and 84 in the House. The vote was taken first in the Chamber of origin.**

**One bill SB 50 – Tax Reform was overridden. The bill was about a \$300 million tax break. Kansans can now itemize on their state income taxes even if they don't itemize on federal returns. Additionally, the standard deduction in Kansas has been increased to \$3,500 (single), \$8,000 (married), and \$6,000 (heads of household). The Kansas Revenue Department will need more people to do audits.**

**The S Sub for HB 2313 Tax Bill went through several votes and versions until it was finally approved late Friday evening. The School Property Tax Levy Bill re-authorizes the 20-mill property tax levy for school years 2021-2022 and 2022-2023. A vehicle property tax exemption for up to two motor vehicles was extended to all current members in good standing with the Kansas Army National Guard, Kansas Air National Guard, or U.S. military reserve forces stationed in Kansas, beginning in tax year 2022. At the end of the session the Senate pulled out the Golden Year Bill that would help disabled veterans, and people 65 and older, with their property tax.**

**HB 2187-includes having First-time Home Buyers Savings Accounts. Now, saving for the purchase or construction of a first-time home is tax deductible up to \$6,000 for a couple (or \$3,000 for an individual) for a year. It starts in 2022. The total savings is capped at \$48,000 for a married couple and \$24,000 for an individual.**

**SB 159 includes for hundreds of judicial employees. This year's budget includes a 5% raise for judges and justices, 2.5% raises for judicial employees, and 70 new positions for court services officers to help with the backlog of cases. There were no other state employee raises included in this year's budget.**

**Sine Die was on May 26, 2021 and was the formal end of the legislative session. It was the final adjournment of the annual session. Having concluded all official business, the House and Senate adjourned at 11:35 AM.**

The Republican caucus re-convened at 11:45 a.m. in the Senate Chamber to select a new Majority Leader to replace Senator Gene Suellentrop, who was removed from his position prior to the Veto Session. There were 3 nominees: Larry Alley from Winfield; Jeff Longbine from Emporia; and, Richard Hildebrand from Galena. After two ballots, Larry Alley was elected Majority Leader. That created a vacancy in the Assistant Majority Leader position. Renee Erickson, Wichita, was selected as Assistant Majority Leader by acclamation.

When the Kansas Legislature adjourns and leaves bills on the table they will be good next year. They will pull the bills out and you will wonder where they came from.

The Legislature will reconvene on January 10, 2022 at 2:00 p.m.

We will continue to monitor the activities of the House and Senate. If something comes up the Kansas Federation President will send out an E-mail.
